11 am to 3:30 pm - The Children's Village, Talbot County Free Library


11 am to 4 pm - The Marketplace's food and retail vendors, local organizations, located by the Live Music Block Party

11:45 am - Author Jeff McGuiness shares his newly released book, *Bear Me Into Freedom*, followed by book signing, Talbot County Free Library



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Speaker: Joy Priest

Joy Priest is the author of HORSEPOWER (Pitt Poetry Series, 2020), selected by U.S. Poet Laureate Natasha Trethewey as the winner of the Donald Hall Prize for Poetry. She is the recipient of a 2021 National Endowment for the Arts fellowship, a 2019-2020 Fine Arts Work Center fellowship, and the Stanley Kunitz Memorial Prize from the American Poetry Review. Her poems have appeared in the Academy of American

Poets' Poem-a-Day series and The Atlantic, among others, as well as in commissions for the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston (MFAH) and the Los Angeles County Museum of Art (LACMA). Her essays have appeared in The Bitter Southerner, Poets & Writers, ESPN, and The Undefeated. Priest received her MFA in poetry with a certificate in Women & Gender Studies from the University of South Carolina. She has facilitated poetry workshops with incarcerated juvenile and adult women, and has taught creative writing, comedy, gender & sexuality, and African American Arts & Culture at the university level. Joy is an Inprint MD Anderson Foundation Fellow and a doctoral student in Literature & Creative Writing at the University of Houston. She is the editor of Once a City Said: A Louisville Poets' Anthology, forthcoming from Sarabande Books in 2023.



Author: Jeff McGuiness

Jeff McGuiness is a photographer and writer living in St. Michaels, Maryland. An avid boater, he enjoys exploring his beloved Chesapeake, divining the mysteries it holds.

McGuiness was born in California and grew up in suburban Washington, D.C. After graduating from college with an art degree in 1969, he spent the next four years in the U.S. Air Force as a

photographer during the Vietnam conflict. He then worked as a commercial photographer in St. Louis for a time before deciding to pursue a law degree.

McGuiness practiced law in Washington, D.C. for more than four decades, working on public policy and non-profit organizations. The St. Michaels Museum at St. Mary's Square will publish his latest work, Bear Me Into Freedom: The Talbot County of Frederick Douglass. The 284-page photographic essay couples words Frederick Douglass used to describe his eleven years in Talbot County with imagery created by McGuiness depicting what the fields, buildings, paths, and waterways may have looked like when Douglass lived there. Those eleven years are an integral part of Douglass's three autobiographies, the most important slave narrative in American literature which Bear Me Into Freedom now illustrates.

Keynote Speaker: Robert S. Levine

Robert S. Levine is Distinguished University Professor of English and Distinguished Scholar-Teacher at the University of Maryland, College Park. He is the author of Conspiracy and Romance: Studies in Brockden Brown, Cooper, Hawthorne, and Melville; Martin Delany, Frederick Douglass, and the Politics of Representative Identity; Dislocating Race and Nation: Episodes in Nineteenth-Century American Literary Nationalism; The Lives of Frederick Douglass; Race, Transnationalism, and Nineteenth-Century American Literary Studies; and The Failed Promise: Reconstruction, Frederick Douglass, and the Impeachment of Andrew Johnson. He has edited a number of books, including The New Cambridge Companion to Herman Melville and Norton Critical Editions of Hawthorne's The House of the Seven Gables and Melville's Pierre. Levine has received fellowships from the NEH and the Guggenheim Foundation. In 2014 the American Literature Section of the MLA awarded him the Hubbell Medal for Lifetime Achievement in American Literary Studies.
